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Dan Rodkin called the meeting to order at 12:05 p.m., and welcomed the members and guests.

Teresa Lanier reviewed the revenue, expenditure and encumbrance report. Lanier shared that as of August 6, 2010, approximately 38% of the projected revenue for Fiscal Year (FY) 2010-2011 has been collected. Expenditures to date are approximately 5% and encumbrances are approximately 50% of the expenditure budget. Lanier stated that the available carry forward funds are \$241,733.98. Lanier also mentioned that the Office of Community Service has changed its name to Office of Civic Engagement & Service; next month, the name on the budget will be changed.

The first request was presented by Lanier, \$79,075 for salary increases for full and part-time staff as well as increases to the Florida Retirement System benefits and health insurance benefits. She further requested these funds as a permanent budget increase. Motion was made by Portia Taylor to approve \$79,075 as a permanent salary budget increase. The motion was seconded by Katey Sands. Motion approved.

The second request was presented by Lanier, \$1,000 for the Perry Center student activities as a permanent budget increase to the Educational Center budget. Motion was made by Katey Sands to approve \$1,000 as a permanent budget increase. The motion was seconded by Lauren Bates. Motion approved.

The third request was presented by Lauren Bates, \$77,257 for S Building renovations. A one page document was disseminated to the committee which outlined the renovation plan. Bates explained the desired outcomes. Discussion ensued. Deina Bossa inquired about the \$10,000 from the Student Health Care Center (SHCC) to be used for the renovation. Rodkin explained that the SHCC contract, which was not completed until after the last A & S Fees Budget Committee meeting, was less than expected and the SHCC budget could be reduced by \$10,000 and applied to renovations. Motion was made by Bill Little to approve the request as presented, including \$10,000 from the SHCC. The motion was seconded by Lauren Bates. Discussion ensued. Motion approved (8 in favor, 3 opposed).

The fourth request was presented by Jim Keites, \$50,000 for FY 2010/11 Tournament Travel Budget. Keites presented a document to the committee outlining the athletic tournament travel history and expense for the past three years. Discussion ensued. Motion was made by Lauren Bates to approve \$50,000. The motion was seconded by Alex Cordelle. Katey Sands moved to amend the request to \$40,000. The amendment was seconded by Deina Bossa. Amendment approved. Motion approved.

Due to time restraints, Dr. Taylor asked to table the advisors stipend request until the September meeting.

The fifth request was presented by Austin Brinza, \$34,000 seed money to start-up a new program at Santa Fe called Five Pathways to Persistence. The program will provide tutoring and mentoring with the goal of decreasing the student dropout rate amongst those students entering Santa Fe with a GED. Motion was made by Katey Sands to approve \$10,000. The motion was seconded by Portia Taylor. Motion approved.

The next A & S Budget Committee meeting will be Monday, September 13, 2010, at 12:00 Noon in S-141.

Meeting was adjourned at 1:20 p.m.

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Dan Rodkin called the meeting to order at 12:05 p.m., and welcomed the members and guests.

Teresa Lanier reviewed the revenue, expenditure and encumbrance report. Lanier shared that as of September 10, 2010, approximately 48% of the projected revenue for Fiscal Year 2010-2011 has been collected. Expenditures to date are approximately 14% and encumbrances are approximately 45% of the expenditure budget. Lanier stated that the available carry forward funds are \$34,401.98. Lanier also mentioned that the name for Office of Community Service has changed to Office of Civic Engagement & Service and Pathways to Persistence has been added.

The first request was presented by Morgan Higman and David Price requesting \$8,275, which is partial funding for the Model United Nations (MUN) trip to New York for the National MUN conference. Higman showed a PowerPoint presentation and handed out a printout about MUN, and the breakdown cost of the trip. Motion was made by Bill Little to approve \$8,275. The motion was seconded by Portia Taylor. Motion passes.

The second request was presented by Angela Long requesting \$7,723.28 for the Alternative Spring Break trip to New Orleans, LA. Long presented a PowerPoint presentation showing last year’s Alternative Spring Break trip to Washington, DC. A document was given to the committee members of the cost breakdown for the New Orleans, LA trip. Taylor commended the students for being part of this event last year and the ones for this year who will be spending their Spring Break volunteering. Taylor strongly endorsed the program and made a motion to approve \$7,723.28. The motion was seconded by Bill Little. Question and debate pursued. Motion passes.

The third request was presented by Angela Long requesting \$17,000 for student organization advisors stipends for student organizations for Fall 2010. Long presented a document to the committee showing the history and the formula used to create the funding. Discussion ensued. Motion was made by Deina Bossa to approve \$17,000.00. The motion was seconded by Kelsey Simmons. Motion passes.

Lanier stated the balance remaining in carry forward funds is \$1,403.70.

Rodkin asked a representative from each of the program areas supported by A & S Fees to share current and upcoming activities with the Committee.

## **DEPARTMENT REPORTS**

### **Athletics**

#### **SF Intercollegiate Athletic Programs**

- Men's and women's basketball continue to prepare for the November beginning to their 2010/2011 seasons. The men's team has a few players recovering from injuries and rehabbing from off season medical treatments, but should be a full strength by early season. The women are at nearly full strength and continue to hold morning conditioning and practice sessions.
- The Saints baseball team began its "Fall Ball" practice season with a doubleheader sweep yesterday. The Saints got some strong pitching performances and timely hitting to get the wins.
- Saints softball will begin their "Fall Ball" season next weekend.

#### **SF Intramurals**

- Flag Football got underway last week with 286 students currently signed up on 20 teams. This number usually increases by about 40-50 as the season progresses.
- Fifty-five students signed up for beach volleyball. The season starts Sept. 14
- The Tuesday and Thursday Yoga class is averaging 26 students, faculty and staff per class.
- Ultimate Frisbee has 25 students signed up
- Twelve students have signed up for the Racquetball tournament in October
- Ten students have signed up for the weightlifting competition in October

#### **SF Fitness Center**

- The Fitness Center is off to a fast start this 2010/2011 school year. The Fitness Center is now offering Zumba two nights a week, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5:00 – 6:00pm in S326/327 to all Faculty/Staff/Students. Also, the Fitness Center is providing Personal Training consultation to all Faculty/Staff Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 1:00 – 3:00pm.
- We will be receiving some new cardio equipment within the next month. Two new Treadmills and Two new Ellipticals are going to be delivered and installed by the professionals at Gym Source.

- Also, visitor numbers are up. We have had a total of 7,400 visitors for the months of July and August thus far. Compared to last year's 6,979 visitors for the months of July and August, we have had 421 more visitors compared to last year's numbers.

### **SF Club Sports**

- Activity among the club sports is picking up. The Cheerleaders have held early tryouts with another scheduled soon. The roster is presently preparing for the season with about 12-15 members in place.
- Golf is the latest Club Sport offering that is proceeding with creating a Charter and election of officers this week. An organizational meeting will be held in the gym tomorrow afternoon at 4 pm for anyone who is interested in joining.
- Other sports that are moving forward with 2010/2011 organizational procedures include: Aikido, Wrestling, Volleyball and Fencing.

  - 30 students attended Part 1 and 31 students attended Part 2
  - Provided information about services available for students at SFC and in the community at part 1
  - Provided information about legal requirements for international students and the health insurance at part 2
  - After orientation, many students came to the office to make their academic plans and/or to ask questions. It shows the meetings went well.
  - It was the first time we have broken down the orientation into two parts. We really think that this was a big improvement.

- 8/31 Social Gathering
  - The purpose of the event was to give the students an opportunity to get to know each other and developed a sense of community
  - Approximately 37 students attended the event (despite our best effort some attendees might not have signed the sign-in sheets provided)

### **Student Government and Student Organizations**

Executive Branch update:

- Contributed \$150 to the Operation Care Package initiative.
- Santa Fe College was in the national spotlight on July 28, when Austin Brinza, Patrick McConn, Frederick Parks, and Brittany Peterson along with Dr. Angela Long, Coordinator for Student Leadership and Activities, met with Education under Secretary Dr. Martha Kanter in Washington, D.C., to present the results of a homegrown initiative entitled the “Five Pathways to Persistence” program. The goal of the meeting was to discover ways to reduce the national community college dropout rate of approximately 50 percent based upon research conducted by Dr. Long. The proposal the group crafted is called "**Five Pathways to Persistence.**" The five factors include creating: (1) financial aid opportunities and packages in a timely and efficient manner, (2) opportunities for bonding between faculty and students, (3) a "freedom-to-fail" attitude that accepts that mistakes are a part of the learning process, and (4) opportunities to be engaged in leadership roles, and (5) creating an exciting and engaging campus experience. To date, the initial stages of the Pathways to Persistence program has been set-up to try and implement modeling, tutoring, and seminar series.
- Completed compartmentalized recycling setups.
- Published “Welcome Back” Newspaper edition.
- Community Outreach helped host “Stop the Violence” Rally.
- Worked on trying to provide debit/credit card purchasing option for club fundraising activities.
- Worked with Gator Growl staff. Appointed SF students to serving as both sales and marketing representatives.
- Forming committee to tackle the Transportation Bill. Started new site on Facebook to rally this cause at Start the Bus!
- Celebrated the UF/SF gator den opening. Looking forward to continuing “Saints Today, Gators Tomorrow” program.
- Petition and debates regarding smoking policy issues.
- Working on bringing a farmers market to campus.
- Represented Santa Fe at the FJCCSGA Presidents Assembly.
- Smoothly transitioning into fall with new directors and recruitment plans.

#### Student Senate Update:

- Growing weekly in Senate Attendance. Meetings being held in WA-108. Current number of senators is around 80 members.
- Passed a resolution on 9/8/10 entitled, “Condemnation of Intolerance Resolution” boldly proclaiming student support to not approve the Quran burning at Dove Worldwide Outreach Center in Gainesville, FL.
- Passed a resolution on 9/8/10 entitled, “Recognition and Remembrance of September 11<sup>th</sup> Resolution” recognizing student support in honor of those who died on September 11<sup>th</sup>, 2001.

#### Student Government Programming Events:

- "Beat the Heat" July 14th from 11-2pm. This event was to welcome incoming freshmen as well as the returning student to summer B. The event consist free food & drinks and a foam pool.
- "Know you Better" (Blount center) July 21st from 11:30-1:30pm. This event was to show downtown students recognition as well. The event consist free food & drinks and promotional items.

- "Welcome Back Students" August 24th from 11-2pm. This event was to welcome incoming freshmen as well as returning students. The event consist free food & drinks, promotional items, and gladiator joust.

### **Student Health Care Center**

- The flu shots are in; they are \$15 for students and \$25 for faculty and staff.

### **Student Legal Service**

- Since August 9, SLS has opened new cases for 18 students, covering related to landlord-tenant, divorce, custody, child support, removing barriers to employment (e.g., expungement and pardons), consumer, immigration, and SSI
- Over 60 hours were logged on SFC cases during the period (which includes reduced office hours the first 2 weeks of this period)
- 24 SFC Cases were closed
- SLS currently has 38 open cases for Santa Fe students

- Study Abroad Trip proposals are due on Friday, September 17. The committee will review the proposals to determine which trips will be held, and the trips will be posted to the website for advertising.

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Dan Rodkin called the meeting to order at 12:02 p.m., and welcomed the members and guests.

Teresa Lanier reviewed the revenue, expenditure and encumbrance report. Lanier shared that as of October 8, 2010, approximately 49% of the projected revenue for Fiscal Year 2010-2011 has been collected. Expenditures to date are approximately 18% and encumbrances are approximately 46% of the expenditure budget. Lanier stated that the available carry forward funds are \$1,403.70.

The first request was presented by Bill Little requesting \$1,400 for the World Humanities Expo (WHE). Little distributed a printout with the WHE budget proposal and an explanation of the event, which is free and open to Santa Fe College and the general public. The expo runs November 15-19, 2010 from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. in R-01.

Rodkin requested committee hear the second funding request before voting on the funding allocation. Committee agreed.

The second request was presented by Bobby Hom requesting \$1,000 for Research in Undergraduate Education (RUE). The funding would defray costs associated with student travel for the winner of a Provost Research Award. Funds may also be used for students’ poster printing costs, office supplies, minor equipment and prize certificates for the Research and Creative Projects Festival. Hom distributed a printout explaining RUE and the 2010-2011 schedules. Discussion ensued.

Rodkin reminded the committee that the available carry forward funds are \$1,403.70, and requests on the floor are for \$2,400. Katey Sands suggested \$500 for RUE and the remaining \$903.70 for WHE. Discussion ensued. Motion was made by Katey Sands to approve \$1,000 to WHE and \$403.70 to RUE. The motion was seconded by Kelsey Simmons. Motion passes.

Rodkin presented a presentation of a proposed funding formula for upper-division (UD) A&S fees. The committee was given a handout with a draft of proposal. The proposed funding formula will create an annual allocation for upper-division students by taking the difference

between the UD A&S Fee per-credit and lower-division (LD) A&S Fee per credit, multiplied by the projected total number of UD credits. These funds would be proportionally split up and allocated to the academic departments which house the UD programs to be spent on co-curricular programs for their UD students. If the A&S Fees Budget Committee adopts this formula, it will be used this spring when creating the 2011-2012 A&S budget. Discussion ensued. Dennis O'Hearn agreed to contact colleagues around the state to see what they are doing. Rodkin asked the committee members to review the proposal with their constituents and bring feedback and suggestions for improvements to the November A&S meeting.

Rodkin asked a representative from each of the program areas supported by A & S Fees to share current and upcoming activities with the Committee.

Rodkin mentioned to the committee that Kelsey Simmons, now-former Student Body Treasurer, has resigned, creating a vacancy on the A&S Fees Committee. Rodkin also noted Committee member Alex Cardelle is graduating in December and has been accepted into the University of Florida. Student Government is working to fill both vacancies and we looking forward to welcoming two new committee members from Student Government at the January meeting.

Rodkin asked a representative from each of the program areas supported by A & S Fees to share current and upcoming activities with the Committee. Reports are attached.

Dan Rodkin called the meeting to order at 12:05 PM and welcomed the members and guests.

Teresa Lanier reviewed the revenue, expenditure and encumbrance report. Lanier shared that as of January 7, 2011, approximately 89% of the projected revenue for Fiscal Year 2010-2011 has been collected. Expenditures to date are approximately 41% and encumbrances are approximately 32% of the expenditure budget. Lanier stated that the available carry forward funds are \$0.00.

Rodkin mentioned to the committee that Greg Cohen is the new Student Body Treasurer, and he welcomed Cohen to the committee.

Rodkin explained the first item of new business, regarding a revenue budget adjustment and an allocation to the new bachelor’s degree program in Early Childhood Education that began spring 2011. Ten students are currently enrolled in and twelve are expected to enroll this summer. This will add \$990 in A & S Fee revenue that was previously unbudgeted. Using the new funding formula for upper-division students approved last semester, the committee could then allocate \$196 to the Social & Behavioral Sciences Department’s Early Childhood Education program to be used for co-curricular programs for this cohort of students. If the committee chooses not to do that then Student Life would fund co-curricular programs for Early Childhood Education students up to \$200 from its existing budget. Rodkin asked the committee if they wanted to increase the revenue budget and also make an allocation. Motion made by Portia Taylor to increase the revenue budget by \$990 and allocate \$200 to the department with the remainder as Carry Forward funds. Motion was seconded by Katey Sands. Rodkin asked for debate or discussion on motion. Bill Little asked if the two bachelors degree programs Santa Fe already has were funded by this committee? Rodkin stated that the business program is funded through the Student Life budget and the clinical science program is funded through the Perry Center allocation. Next year, the funding formula will be applied to all bachelors’ degree programs. Motion passed.

The second item of new business was funding priorities for the 2011-2012 fiscal year. Rodkin stated that with the 3% ~ increase in enrollment, A&S revenue will be increased in the next fiscal year – but not enough to cover the salary raises approved in June 2010. If the A&S fee is also increased than additional revenue will be available. Rodkin asked how the committee wanted any additional funds allocated. Katey Sands requested funding programs added this year. Bill Little requested that World Humanities Expo and Research and Undergraduate Education be added as recurring line items. Taylor asked about an increase to the Fine Arts budget with the opening of the new Fine Arts Hall. Rodkin stated he would like to be able to fund Athletics

Tournament Travel and Adviser Stipends, two existing line items which were not funded during the spring budget allocation. Taylor asked to have the advisors stipend as a permanent budgeted item. Vilma Fuentes commented that the A&S committee has funded the Model UN trips to New York City for the National Model UN for the past two years – it would be nice to have that funding up front as part of the annual budget. Nyamuame and Price requested additional funding for Study Abroad to increase the number of Travel Grants and/or the amount for which a grant may be awarded.

Lanier commented that all these ideas are good ones, but until we know our revenue, we must be careful about committing to additional line items or increases to existing items until we have a better idea of next year's revenue. In requesting an increase in the A & S fees, we do not know if we will get an increase; at minimum looking at the same budget as last year with any increase from enrollment going towards staff salaries. Some of the funds in the 2010-2011 expenditure budget were funded from Carry Forward money from 2009-2010, not revenue, which is not good fiscal policy. Taylor suggested that SG present a resolution to the President recommending an increase in A & S fees per credit hour would be helpful. Discussion ensued.

Rodkin asked a representative from each of the program areas supported by A & S Fees to share current and upcoming activities with the Committee. Reports are attached.

The next A & S Budget Committee meeting will be Monday, February 14, 2011, at 12:00 Noon in S-141.

Meeting was adjourned at 1:PM.

## **Athletics**

**Women's Basketball** – The Saints are 8-10 overall and 0-1 in the MFC. Five of the losses have come against nationally ranked opponents. The team has five remaining home games and six road games. All games can be watched live on [www.psblive.com](http://www.psblive.com).

**Misc. Basketball** – Admission to all SF home games is free to faculty, staff and students of SF who present a valid SF ID.... The SF Athletics Department is coordinating many "Special Nights" to honor specific areas of the college and highlight the contribution they make to Santa Fe. If your group would like to participate, please contact Jim Keites or Scott Jamison at the Athletics Department.... The Santa Fe Cheerleaders have been doing a great job this season and will continue to cheer at as many games as possible.

**Saints Softball** – After another strong Fall Ball season, the regular season begins on January 29 in Clearwater with the JUCO Kickoff Classic. The first home double header is Feb. 4 at 2:00pm against St. Petersburg College. The Saints have won six consecutive Mid-Florida Conference titles.

**Saints Baseball** – The Saints Baseball team finished up its "Fall Ball" season undefeated (19-0-3) back in November and will look to build on that when the regular season starts January 28 in Tampa. The first home game is January 29 at 12:00 pm. The Saints have won back to back Mid-Florida Conference titles.

**SF Intramurals** - Spring Intramurals get started on March 17. Basketball, Soccer, Ultimate Frisbee, Racquetball tournament and two weightlifting competitions will take place. The Fitness Center/Athletics laundry room has been completely remodeled. The room has a whole new look with more open floor space, fresh paint, and a new tile floor. The new Washer and Dryer have been installed and are working great, with good feedback from all the coaches and the intramural department.

**December 8:** SGP end of semester social at Olive Garden. We used this opportunity to reflect upon the challenges while congratulating SGP members for the successes from the Fall 2010 semester.

SGP completed the semester with extensive planning for the upcoming **Jan. 13<sup>th</sup>** “Spring Fling-A-Ling” event with trampoline bungee jumping, a rock wall, a magician, gladiator joust, pizza, cotton candy, popcorn, nachos, drinks, and giveaways. The event will be held in the Oak Grove from 10am-2pm.

## **Student Health Care Center**

The SHCC continues to serve SF students in another active year. ARNP hours were increased to 16 per week beginning with the start of the fall semester. In 2010, the practitioners had 820 patient visits. These include visits for annual GYN exams, contraceptive services, mental health needs, and student illness. For fiscal year 2009-10, the total number of ARNP visits was 703. If the current trend continues, total visits for fiscal year 2010-11 will exceed that number. This was expected due to the increased ARNP hours. This illustrates the need for services, and the readiness of students to access those services when available.

RN patient encounters totaled 2,169 for 2010. So there was a total of 2,989 students visits with either an RN or ARNP in 2010. This amounts to an average of nearly 250 students served per month (over 60 a week on average). Once again, this shows the need for services and underscores the usefulness of the SHCC as a resource for patients.

One role of the SHCC is in disease prevention, a key reason for the annual flu shot campaign. The 2010 flu season has seen less utilization of this service than anticipated. As of 12/17/10, a total of 125 SF students and staff have received their flu shot at the SHCC. This may reflect the fact that this year there was a charge of \$15 for students and \$25 for staff for the flu shots. While this is below the cost available in the community, it may have had an impact. The SHCC expects to see additional influenza immunizations in the early part of spring semester, so the actual impact will need to be assessed once the flu season is over.

Another issue impacting SF students in terms of health services is the recent decision of the Alachua County Commission to rule students ineligible for the Choices insurance program. Their rationale for doing so is that students have access to the SHCC, so do not need other “coverage”. This does not reflect the reality of services available to our students at the SHCC, but has reduced health care options for any person enrolled at SF. This issue is being addressed through the Choices Advisory Board and the County Commission, but has resulted in some students and potential students electing to forgo pursuing their education in order to retain health coverage. The SHCC staff will continue working on improving services and delivering the best care available to our students in 2011.

## **Student Legal Services – No Report**

### **Study Abroad**

The following document is a report by the office of International Education to student Activity and Service (A&S) in recognition of their financial support. The report begins with a summary of

the study abroad trips that are scheduled to occur this year. Following that are details on the rounds of grant awards made possible by A&S funding.

**Santa Fe College, 2011 Study Abroad Trips**

*China: Beijing and Xi'an (Deborah Clark and Robin Hardee): Summer A, 2011*

Courses: HUM2930, MAN4102, HUM2410, GEB1011, GEB2350, IDS2930

*Instructional intent:* The focus of this trip will be on China's reformed economic practices and the growth on individual wealth and entrepreneurship. In addition, the experience will include Asian Humanities and a close look at the history, culture, arts and ideas of India, China and Japan.

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*Italy: Rome, Assisi and Florence; Paris, France (Matthew Newell and Valerie Aslakson-Jennings): Summer A, 2011*

Course: ARH1000

*Instructional intent:* To increase intercultural communication skills of students when navigating foreign environments. In addition, students will experience two and three-dimensional visual arts and develop the vocabulary needed to express opinions regarding art quality, value and significance.

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*Ghana: Accra, Kokrobite and Cape Coast (Heidi Lannon and Naima Brown): Summer A, 2011*

Courses: GEA2420, SYG2000 (6 credits)

*Instructional intent:* To explore cultural geography in the field and to engage in cross-cultural analysis from the sociological perspective. Community service projects are one component of this experience.

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*Ecuador: Quito, Cotacachi and Ayampe (Heather Hall and Donna Waller): Spring, 2011*

Course: ANT2140

*Instructional intent:* This program will use various techniques from cultural ethnography to study the relationship between the natural environment, social and cultural structures, and the phenomenon of cultural change, among several communities in Ecuador.

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*Costa Rica: San Jose, Monte Verde, Arenal Volcano, Le Selva and Sarapiquí (Denise Guerin and Heidi Lannon): Sp, 2011*

Courses: PCB1030L, GEA1920

*Instructional intent:* To foster an understanding of the interconnectedness and commonality that exists between different places and cultures worldwide. Experiences will focus on cultural diversity as well as fieldwork in biological diversity.

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**\*\*CANCELLED – not enough students**

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*Germany: Berlin, Nurnberg and Munich (Vilma Fuentes and David Price): Summer A, 2011*

Courses: CPO2001, WOH2022

*Instructional intent:* Explore the major political, historic and cultural relevance of Germany through visits to historic landmarks (German Parliament, Check Point Charlie, Brandenburg Gate, Nazi Rally grounds, Dachau).

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*Sweden: Stockholm and Orebro (Douglas Diekow): Spring 2011*

Course: SYG1222

*Instructional intent:* Cross-cultural study of culture and gender roles using an interdisciplinary social scientific perspective. Students will develop an understanding of the impact culture has on our social experiences through immersion in Swedish culture.

**\*\*CANCELLED – not enough students**

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*Bulgaria: Sofia, Melnik, Rila Monastery, Plovdiv, Veliko Tarnovo; Greece: Thessaloniki, Mount Athos, Kavalia; and Turkey: Edirne, Istanbul (Marin Smilov) Summer A, 2011*

Course: HUM2930

*Instructional intent:* Students will gain a first-hand experience of the most ancient sources of European cultures and religions, focusing on interactions between Paganism, Judaism, Christianity and Islam. Students will develop an increased awareness of the cultural and religious phenomena of the Balkans as well as its role in ancient and modern history.

### **Past SLA Grant Awards – November 2010**

In November 2010, the first round of SLA grant awards for the 2010/2011 academic year took place. Nine students were awarded a total of \$8,000 of funding, with five receiving \$1,000 and four receiving \$750. A break-down of the trips that these students are signed up for can be found on the following page. The awards are given out strictly on the basis of financial needs. The destination is not taken into account.

Two of the awardees were on the Sweden or Costa Rica trips that subsequently had to be cancelled as there were not enough students signed up for them. The student who won the award to go to Costa Rica decided to use her grant to go to Ecuador instead while the student who planned on going to Sweden could not find an alternative trip to join. Since he will be unable to use the \$1,000 awarded to him, that amount of money will be added to the next round of awards.

Dan Rodkin called the meeting to order at 12:05 PM and welcomed the members and guests.

Rodkin mentioned that Jazmyne Green, Elizabeth Rodriguez, Suzanne Santos, and Carlos Sosa are four new students on the committee.

Teresa Lanier reviewed the revenue, expenditure and encumbrance report. Lanier shared that as of February 11, 2011, approximately 89% of the projected revenue for Fiscal Year 2010-2011 has been collected. Expenditures to date are approximately 53% and encumbrances are approximately 26% of the expenditure budget. Lanier stated that the available carry forward funds are \$790.00.

Rodkin explained the first item of new business, regarding the re-allocation of \$3000 Brain Bowl Funds because the team not being able to participate in the tournaments this year. David Price suggested that the money be used for another opportunity that has been brought to the college and it is Model Senate, based on the student version of the US Senate. Price said there were six students that were interested. The cost to start this project would be \$1200 to \$1500. Portia Taylor asked of any previous funding that was denied should have the opportunity first. The discussion pursued. Motion was made by Katey Sands to move \$3,000 from Brain Bowl and place it in Carry Forward. The motion was seconded by Lauren Bates. Motion passed. Rodkin stated that Brain Bowl is zero, and Carry Forward is now at \$3,790. Discussion ensued with using funds for Model Senate. Katey Sands made a motion to allocate \$1,500 towards Model Senate. Motion was seconded by Bill Little. Motion passed.

Rodkin stated that after the reports there would be a discussion on the planning for the 2011-2012 budget.

Rodkin asked a representative from each of the program areas supported by A & S Fees to share current and upcoming activities with the Committee. Reports are attached.

Taylor mentioned to the committee that she had talked with Dr. Sasser about the Student Government presenting a resolution that the A & S Fees be increased for the next fiscal year. She further explained that for the past two years, the A&S fee was not increased, in large part because it appeared the Transportation Bill would be passed by the Florida Legislature, and thus our students would have a new \$2-3/credit hour free added to their tuition. If Student Government wants to see the A&S Fees increased, they need to send forth a resolution stating this. Rodkin stated that the deadline is very close and SG would have two Senate meetings to

make that decision. The President's staff will be discussing A&S Fees on the morning of Monday, February 28.

Rodkin discussed projections for the 2011-2012 budget. The salary increases approved last summer and the need to fund activities at the Perry & Kirkpatrick Centers will cost ~\$80,000 in recurring fees to this budget. Enrollment increases alone will bring in about \$60,000 in new recurring revenues, leaving a ~\$20,000 shortfall. The options that must be considered are 1) No increase the A&S Fees, and 2) a moderate increase to the A&S Fee.

Rodkin asked all funded departments to submit two budget proposals:

- 1) Assuming no increase in the A&S Fee, please submit a budget proposal showing how you would spend an allocation **\*no higher\*** than for the current year, and preferably indicating how you could trim your budget slightly, helping us cut \$20K overall.
- 2) Assuming the A&S Fees is raised, please submit a budget proposal showing how you would spend an allocation similar to this year, perhaps with a slight increase as funding allows. Be sure to explain the need for any budget increase.

Rodkin asked that the two proposals sent to him by Monday, February 28. At the March 14 A&S Meeting, a preliminary budget proposal for 2011-2012 will be presented for the committee to discuss, with a goal of approving the budget at the April A & S Fees Committee meeting.

The next A & S Budget Committee meeting will be Monday, March 14, 2011, at 12:00 Noon in S-141.

- The Little School is fully enrolled for the Spring 2011 semester; all of our classes are at capacity with a total enrollment of 90 children.
- We currently have 5 full time interns from early childhood education, 3 regular volunteers completing hours to satisfy course requirements, and approximately 12 students per week coming to the Little School to practice teaching art, math, and science activities to the children.
- Teachers from various disciplines regularly bring their students to work with the children at the Little School.
- We are planning for the “March for Babies”, a mini-walk across campus to raise money for the March of Dimes. The “March for Babies” will be held on Friday March 4<sup>th</sup>. The Pre-K children will leave the Little School at 9:15 and walk to F building. We are asking that anyone available from 9:15-9:45 to line up along our parade route (see Today at Santa Fe) and drop coins in our buckets. We also have an online Little School Team at [www.marchforbabies.org](http://www.marchforbabies.org) that can accept donations. Our goal is to raise \$250 from the March, online donations, and from families at the Little School. Please support this great cause and come out to cheer for us on March 4<sup>th</sup>.
- Our annual Multicultural Festival will be held in April. We welcome participation from any student organizations. The festival typically represents 20-25 countries with tables of information, artifacts, costumes, entertainment and food. It is fun, informational, and delicious. Please call the Little School to learn more and to become involved.
- The Little School is raising funds for an outdoor Music Station. We have raised almost \$2,500 so far with a yard sale, ticket sales for a chance to win an iPod touch, and catalog sales. We have another spring catalog fundraiser from February 28<sup>th</sup>-March 18<sup>th</sup>. The cost of the equipment is close to \$4,000 so we are 63% of the way there

Stephanie Thorn talked about Alternative Spring Break to New Orleans March 5 – 11. Thorn said that they have had their first meeting with a good response.

Rodkin said Sharla Head-Jones has been working in getting students to sign up and there are about 75 perspective students on the roll for this spring.

## **Student Government**

- We have our new Vice President, Suzanne Santos, joining us on the A&S Fees Committee. She was recently chosen as the replacement for Alex Cardelle after he transferred to UF this past semester. She has been doing a great job and has been working diligently to keep up with the hectic amount of work the Vice President has.
- This past week, Student Body President Austin Brinza, Student Body Vice President Suzanne Santos, SGP Events Chair Guadalupe Lawrence, and Senator Joanna Douglas, went to Tallahassee to lobby for the revised transportation bill. They received a unanimous vote in favor of the bill from the state senate committee. Also, SGP will be having their Sweets for Our Sweets event February 15th, 2011; they will be giving out free Dunkin' Donuts coffee and donuts and will be using this event as a way to promote the Start the Bus! Campaign.
- Elections are on the horizon; paperwork to register for the Executive Branch elections is February 28th, 2011. All students are encouraged to participate. Applications for SGP Programming and Finance Chair are due February 22, 2011. This process will be done by a special committee.
- About 40 Organizations submitted budget request packets for this upcoming fiscal year. The Finance Committee has had multiple 2-3 hour meetings preparing for the Budget Hearings that will take place on February 18th and 19th. Organizations will attend a 15 minute hearing where 8 minutes are allotted to their presentation and 7 to questions from the committee. The number of organizations requesting funds has increased from the previous year.
- The Student Senate recently passed a resolution encouraging the Alachua County Commission to repeal their decision made about CHOICES regarding the eligibility to Santa Fe Students.

## **Student Health Care Center**

Rodkin said that the SHCC is still selling flu shots, and staying very busy. SHCC RN Bruce Major spoke at the recent African American Health Issues program.

## **Student Legal Services**

Rodkin said that SLS is continuing in staying busy and the evaluations received this year from the students were great. Tom Williams, the SLS attorney, is doing a wonderful job.

## **Study Abroad**

The following document is a report by the office of International Education to Student Life in recognition of their financial support. The report begins with a summary of the study abroad trips that are scheduled to occur this year. Following that, on page three, are details on the second round of grant awards made possible by A&S funding.

### **Santa Fe College, 2011 Study Abroad Trips**

*China: Beijing and Xi'an (Deborah Clark and Robin Hardee): Summer A, 2011*

Courses: HUM2930, MAN4102, HUM2410, GEB1011, GEB2350, IDS2930

*Instructional intent:* The focus of this trip will be on China's reformed economic practices and the growth on individual wealth and entrepreneurship. In addition, the experience will include Asian Humanities and a close look at the history, culture, arts and ideas of India, China and Japan.

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Course: ARH1000

*Instructional intent:* To increase intercultural communication skills of students when navigating foreign environments. In addition, students will experience two and three-dimensional visual arts and develop the vocabulary needed to express opinions regarding art quality, value and significance.

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*Ghana: Accra, Kokrobite and Cape Coast (Heidi Lannon and Naima Brown): Summer A, 2011*

Courses: GEA2420, SYG2000 (6 credits)

*Instructional intent:* To explore cultural geography in the field and to engage in cross-cultural analysis from the sociological perspective. Community service projects are one component of this experience.

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*Ecuador: Quito, Cotacachi and Ayampe (Heather Hall and Donna Waller): Spring, 2011*

Course: ANT2140

*Instructional intent:* This program will use various techniques from cultural ethnography to study the relationship between the natural environment, social and cultural structures, and the phenomenon of cultural change, among several communities in Ecuador.

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*Costa Rica: San Jose, Monte Verde, Arenal Volcano, Le Selva and Sarapiquí (Denise Guerin and Heidi Lannon): Sp, 2011*

Courses: PCB1030L, GEA1920

*Instructional intent:* To foster an understanding of the interconnectedness and commonality that exists between different places and cultures worldwide. Experiences will focus on cultural diversity as well as fieldwork in biological diversity.

\*\*CANCELLED – not enough students

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Courses: CPO2001, WOH2022

*Instructional intent:* Explore the major political, historic and cultural relevance of Germany through visits to historic landmarks (German Parliament, Check Point Charlie, Brandenburg Gate, Nazi Rally grounds, Dachau).

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*Sweden: Stockholm and Orebro (Douglas Diekow): Spring 2011*

Course: SYG1222

*Instructional intent:* Cross-cultural study of culture and gender roles using an interdisciplinary social scientific perspective. Students will develop an understanding of the impact culture has on our social experiences through immersion in Swedish culture.

\*\*CANCELLED – not enough students

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*Bulgaria: Sofia, Melnik, Rila Monastery, Plovdiv, Veliko Tarnovo; Greece: Thessaloniki, Mount Athos, Kavalia; and Turkey: Edirne, Istanbul (Marin Smilov) Summer A, 2011*

Course: HUM2930

*Instructional intent:* Students will gain a first-hand experience of the most ancient sources of European cultures and religions, focusing on interactions between Paganism, Judaism, Christianity and Islam. Students will develop an increased awareness of the cultural and religious phenomena of the Balkans as well as its role in ancient and modern history.

## **SL Grant Awardees – January 2011**

In January 2011, the second round of SL grant awards for the 2010/2011 academic year took place. Eight students were awarded \$1,000 each, reaching a total of \$8,000 of funding to be given out. A break-down of the trips that these students are signed up for can be found below. The awards are given out strictly on the basis of financial needs and academic merit. The destination is not taken into account.

Although one trip was forced to cancel (Bulgaria) before going through the grant award process due to low student enrollment, the number of students on both the Germany and Ghana trips is now sufficient to allow those trips to take place. The student numbers on the China and Italy trip have also increased. These increases are largely due to the financial support that the SL grants have given the students.

**A & S FEES BUDGET COMMITTEE**  
**MINUTES**  
**March 14, 2011**

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Dan Rodkin called the meeting to order at 12:05 PM and welcomed the members and guests.

Teresa Lanier reviewed the revenue, expenditure and encumbrance report. Lanier shared that as of March 4, 2011, approximately 90% of the projected revenue for Fiscal Year 2010-2011 has been collected. Expenditures to date are approximately 61% and encumbrances are approximately 25% of the expenditure budget. Lanier stated that the available carry forward funds are \$2,290.00.

The first item of new business was presented by Allison Nyamuame from International Education. She requested \$1,500.00 to fund two \$750 Study Abroad travel grants. If allocated, the grants would be awarded to the next two students in line to receive funding based on the decisions made by the Travel Grants selection committee. These funds would allow students to participate in a Study Abroad experience whom may not otherwise be able to afford it. Nyamuame further shared concerns about students dropping upcoming trips due to the cost of the travel. Funding two additional students will help ensure a trip is not canceled due to students dropping out because of financial challenges. She stated that one student dropping out could cause the entire trip to be canceled. Discussion ensued.

Rodkin requested that both requests be heard before any voting.

The second item of new business was presented by Bill Little for Research in Undergraduate Education. He requested \$790.00 to help fund the Research in Undergraduate Education symposium, taking place throughout April. Little explained that these funds will supplement the initial allocation from fall. Discussion ensued.

Katey Sands motioned to approve \$1,500.00 for International Education for study abroad and \$790.00 for the Research in Undergraduate Education. Motion was seconded by Greg Cohen. Debate and discussion on motion ensued. Motion passed.

The third item of new business was a draft proposal of the 2011-2012 A&S budget. A handout was distributed to each of the members showing the anticipated revenue for FY 2011-2012 and a proposed expenditure budget. Lower division enrollment is projected to increase approximately about 3.5%; upper division enrollment is projected to increase by 70%. Revenue from other sources is projected approximately 8% higher. With the A&S fee projected to remain constant next year (\$6.01 lower division, \$7.50 upper division), the projected revenue for 2011-2012 is \$2,086,237 – an \$83,736 increase from 2010-2011.

The proposed expenditure budget is \$2,117,647. This exceeds the proposed revenue budget by \$31,410. These funds will be provided from unspent budget, or revenue received in excess of projection from FY 2010-2011. Lanier highlighted six aspects of the proposed expenditure budget:

- 1) The proposed budget includes increases to salary budget in several departments, as authorized by the SF Board of Trustees in summer 2010 and approved by the committee as permanent budget increases in August 2010.
- 2) The proposed budget includes a new department for funding upper division co-curricular activities, per the funding formula approved by the committee in November 2010.
- 3) The proposed budget includes funding for the Perry Center and the Kirkpatrick Center, neither of which was funded on the initial expenditure budget for FY 2010-2011.
- 4) The proposed budget includes funding for Pathways for Persistence – this is the only new project with funding proposed for next year.
- 5) The proposed budget includes funding consistent with FY 2010-2011 for contracts with the University of Florida and Three Rivers Legal Services for providing Student Health Care Center and Student Legal Services, respectively. These contracts are still in negotiation, though final numbers are expected by the April 11 meeting.
- 6) The proposed budget contains \$0 funding for Student Organization Advisor Stipends and Athletics Tournament Travel. Despite being a high budget priority, the revenue budget does not allow for these to be funded at this time.

Discussion ensued. Bill Little proposed that World Humanities Expo and Research in Undergraduate Education be added with zero budget. Rodkin added that Model Senate should also be added with a zero budget.

Rodkin reminded the committee that the A & S fee may be increased for FY 2011-2012. If it is increased, the proposal coming to the committee in April would reflect the budget priorities expressed at the January and February committee meetings. Rodkin said that there would be no voting today on the budget as this budget was a draft proposal.

Rodkin asked a representative from each of the program areas supported by A & S Fees to share current and upcoming activities with the Committee. Reports are attached.

The next A & S Budget Committee meeting will be Monday, April 11, 2011, at 12:00 Noon in S-141.

Meeting was adjourned at 1:00PM.

The only item of new business was the budget proposal of the A&S fees Expenditure Budget for the 2011-2012 fiscal year (*see attached*). The proposed expenditure budget contains five budget lines with zero funding, including Advisor Stipends, Model Senate, Research in Undergraduate Education (RUE), World Humanities Expo, and Athletic Tournament Travel. Bill Little asked whether these programs or budgets would be considered before other carry forward requests. Rodkin stated that these were high budget priorities but that other requests may be heard before the committee could decide how best to allocate the carry forward monies.

Lanier also presented the break-down of the A&S Fees anticipated revenue for FY 2011-2012 and stated that she anticipates an approximate 3.5% increase in revenue. The expected revenue is forecast to be \$31,410 less than the proposed expenditure budget. This shortfall will be funded using Carry Forward from the FY 2010-2011 budget.

After a brief discussion, Lauren Bates motioned to approve the proposed FY 2011-2012 expenditure budget in the amount of \$2,117,647. The motion was seconded by Katey Sands. Motion passed.

Rodkin asked a representative from each of the program areas supported by A & S Fees to share current and upcoming activities with the Committee. Reports are attached.

Rodkin thanked the students and staff in attendance for serving on the committee this year.

The A & S Budget Committee will reconvene in August 2011.
