Dr. Tracey Reeves, Director of Student Life, called the meeting to order at 12:04 p.m. and welcomed the members and guests.

Teresa Lanier reviewed the revenue, expenditure, and encumbrance report. As of February 8, 2019, revenue collected for Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-2019 is about 82%, which is less than ideal. The unencumbered carry forward balance is \$0, as the committee previously voted to earmark those funds for next fiscal year.

Dr. Reeves introduced the sole item of new business, a discussion on the budget for FY 2019-2020. Lanier provided the committee with budget information as requested at the previous meeting. She noted that about 59% of A&S fees are allocated to salaries and 31.5% of fees are allocated to contractual obligations, thus, about 9.5% of funding is available for reductions. Discussion ensued regarding impact of budget reductions on departments. Lanier also highlighted the history of anticipated revenue, realized revenue, and expenditures beginning in FY 2014-2015. To adjust for a decline in enrollment, Lanier formulated an updated revenue budget for 2019-2020 by reducing realized revenue from FY 2017-2018 by about 3%. After accounting for the committee’s foresight to set aside approximately \$142,000 of carry forward funds, the necessary budget reductions amount to \$66,355, or about 30% of available funds to establish a realistic budget for FY 2019-2020. Dr. Reeves stated that Student Life staff would work to identify cost-saving methods to offset the percentage of reductions. Robust discussion ensued regarding students in programs who do not pay A&S Fees, reviewing realized revenue from the previous fiscal year after the start of a new fiscal year, rising costs and declining revenue, and potential for certain program costs to be assumed by Fund 1. Dr. Brown clarified that Fund 1 monies currently support a portion of athlete’s insurance, but further evaluation would be needed to see if there is available recurring funding for additional expenses. Ryan Hamilton requested information regarding budget lines added under the A&S Fees budget in the past five years. This discussion will continue at the next meeting.

The first item of new business regarding the date of the March meeting was introduced by Dr. Reeves. The committee made no motion to move the date of the March meeting despite its proximity to Spring Break. The March meeting date remains the same.

Dr. Reeves invited committee members present to share department reports from their areas.

The next committee meeting will be held March 11, 2019 in S-141 at noon.

Meeting adjourned at 12:54 PM.

Department Reports

Brain Bowl

- The Santa Fe College Brain Bowl team currently has 15 members, of which 10 participate regularly in practices and competitions. In January, the team had a fundraising tournament, of which proceeds were deposited in the team's Fund 6 account which we plan to use for attending a tournament in Orlando, Florida in May of this year.
- Six eligible team members traveled to Bradenton, Florida January 25-26 to participate in the NAQT (National Association of Quiz Tournaments) sectional tournaments. Multiple CCCT tournaments (sectionals) are organized throughout the United States, and the top 24 teams are invited to participate in the NAQT Community College Championship Tournament (CCCT). This year, the Santa Fe College team ranked 15th and received an invitation to participate. The team will travel to Orlando, Florida, where the CCCT will be held this year from March 1-2.
- On February 9, the Brain Bowl team participated with two teams in the Florida College System Activities Association (FCSAA) Florida Regional Championships. We were runners-up for the past three consecutive years in this tournament, every year since I took on the coaching responsibilities for the team. This year we were undefeated and became regional champions. The second team placed third, but only the top two teams are invited to compete in the FCSAA Florida State Champions. The winning team of four students will travel to Bradenton, Florida, March 28-30 to attend the FCSAA Brain Bowl State Championship tournament.
- As coach, on behalf of all the students participating in Brain Bowl, I would like to thank the A&S committee for their support of this academic team that continues to represent the college at the highest levels of quiz bowl in the state and the nation. Civic Engagement & Service

- On January 15 CES specialist Sarah Blanc presented a 90-minute bystander intervention overview to student affairs staff. This interactive bystander prevention overview provides a new framework for eliminating power-based personal violence, generating campus-wide buy-in, and initiating the process of behavioral change. There was no cost associated with this training.
- January 16: Human Trafficking Awareness Event - SF professor Richard Tovar discussed his work with the Alachua County Coalition Against Human Trafficking in recognition of Human Trafficking Awareness Month. The presentation provided an overview of human trafficking abroad and in Alachua County and provided students with opportunities to get involved in the fight against human trafficking. CES provided beverages and pizza for \$48.
- January 20: MLK Day of Service with GRACE Marketplace - Eleven SF students participated in a service project at GRACE Marketplace in honor of MLK Day. The group prepared and served lunch alongside UF's Black Law Student Association. There was also a personal care item supply drive in the weeks leading up to the service project which was donated to GRACE Marketplace. There was no cost associated with this service project.
- January 30th: Volunteer Fair - CES hosted the spring Volunteer Fair which included 45 volunteer agencies hoping to recruit new student volunteers. The event was moved from the S-Breezeway to R-001 due to the cold weather and 130 students attended the event. CES provided beverages and pizza to students for \$144 and sandwiches for volunteer agency representatives for \$280.

Ethics Bowl

- The money allotted to the Ethics Bowl Team this year (approximately \$740) was spent to send the Team to an Intercollegiate College Ethics Bowl competition at the University of North Georgia in November, 2018. I drove the team to the competition, where four of our team members competed (Amha Tesfaye, Heather-Ann Irons, Danny Mandeville, and Michael Thielen). The trip was a success, and the team represented Santa Fe well, placing 7th out of 18 teams, and was the only two-year college represented at the competition. Thank you, A & S Fees Budget Committee, for your continued support of the Team!
- Although the Team did not qualify for Nationals this year, we are continuing to hold bi-weekly meetings and are in the process of planning some local events this semester, such as an "Ethics Slam" that would engage not only Ethics Bowl Team members, but also members of some of Santa Fe's other Academic Teams, and some of Santa Fe's faculty members as well--stay tuned for more details (and let me know if you are interested in participating!)

Honors

- The Honors Program at Santa Fe College travelled Feb. 8-10 to the Annual Florida Collegiate Honors Council Conference. The Conference attracts Honors Programs and Colleges from around the state for a weekend of academic presentations. Six students represented SF, with all six presenting on topics covering plant science, political science, and humanities. Two students won prizes, one for a research essay and the other for her creative writing. Travel and conference registration, approximately \$2,000, were supported by Student A&S fees.

International Education

- Two study abroad programs will take a total of 17 students to Belize or Peru during the Spring 2019 semester. Four of these students received a study abroad scholarship from A&S fees. We currently have 33 additional students enrolled for our Summer A study abroad programs to China, Italy, Sweden and the United Kingdom. A total of 6 of these students have been awarded a study abroad scholarship from A&S fees. Friday, February 1 is the last day to enroll for the study abroad programs to Italy and the United Kingdom. Friday, February 15 is the last day to enroll for the study abroad programs to China and Sweden.

International Student Support and Advising

- On January 17, ISSA coordinated a "We Are All Santa Fe" event to welcome new students, and 49 students attended. The cost of this event was about \$60.

- On January 22 ISSA held an event providing information to students on how to transfer to UF and look for scholarships. Nineteen students attended this no-cost event.
- Celebrate Cultures of Asia was held on February 6. This multicultural activity taught students about different cultures in the continent of Asia. Students tasted different kinds of foods from the region, made paper cuttings from China, had the opportunity to receive a small henna tattoo, played a game from Vietnam and listened to popular music from Asia. This event had a cost of about \$650 and 224 students attended.

Student Activities

- Student Life collaborated with Student Government Programming to host a movie night in S-29, featuring *Venom*. Pizza, popcorn, and drinks were served to 82 attendees and about \$150 of SA budget was used for this event.
- Club Rush was held on January 23 and 24. Student Activities collaborated with SG and other student clubs and organizations to provide a resource fair for students looking for opportunities to get involved on campus. Over 35 clubs tabled each day, and 320 students participated on the first day and 240 participated on the second day.

Student Government

- S Student Government collaborated with Student Activities to host the first movie night of the spring semester, a showing of *Venom*. Over 80 students attended this social event.
- Over 400 students participated and attended the annual spring Club Rush events on January 23 and 24, including a record-breaking second day attendance.
- Student Government hosted an Open Mic Night on January 23, and approximately 75 students attended this event.
- More than 135 student officers representing 34 student organizations attended and participated in the spring Student Organization Officer Training (SOOT). In this training, SF Leadership Team Officers facilitate training and answer questions in four breakout sessions related to each of their officers: Student Senate hosted a "Mock Senate," the SG Treasurer outlined details on the budget process, and the President and Vice President discussed how to serve as leaders.

- The SG Finance Committee, comprised of senators and the Treasurer heard 34 budget presentations for each of the student organizations budgets for next fiscal year. The Finance Committee will continue to meet for the next month to determine how much each organization will be awarded from the SG budget.
- Student Government sent a delegation of students to Tallahassee during Session to advocate for student-centered issues and meet with our representatives in the Capitol on February 6 and 7. Student Government participates in three state conferences and one regional conference to practice networking skills, participate in student government processes, and develop leadership skills. SF student Adam Maxwell currently serves more than 800,000 students as the FCSSGA State President and Kate Santacruz also serves on the State Board as the Social Media Chair.
- Student Government applications for Student Body President, Vice President, and Treasurer were due February 8. The Chief Justice position only received one application by the deadline of January 25, so the applications have been reopened until February 13.

Athletics Update 02/11/19 Report

Saints Baseball – The Santa Fe Saints extended their winning streak to seven games and continued their pitching dominance with two more shutouts over South Florida State College, 14-0, 4-0 Saturday afternoon in Avon Park.

The Saints jumped out to a 5-0 lead after two innings in the opener and piled on nine more runs in the final three innings for the convincing victory.

Brock Edge was a perfect 4-for-4 at the plate and Kyler Marquis had two doubles and a single and drove in six runs with 10 of the 11 different players that came to the plate reaching base, nine with hits.

Meanwhile, Connor Churchill (3-0) stymied the Panthers, scattering three hits over six innings while striking out five. The UF transfer has not allowed a run in his three starts totaling 17 innings pitched.

Anthony Arguelles (2-0) got the start in game two for the Saints fresh off a no-hitter last Saturday against SFSC that earned him National Junior College Athletic Association Pitcher of the Week. Although this time giving up six hits, he continued to keep the Panthers off the scoreboard with six shutout innings and six strikeouts.

"Churchill and Arguelles did a great job again of setting the tone early for us in the game," said SF head coach Johnny Wiggs. "They kept throwing up zeros and allowed our offense to get going."

Parker Biederer led the way offensively in game two with three hits while Garrett Mathes and Edge each had a double and a single in the game. Edge had six hits on the day while Mathes had a two-base hit in each game and leads the Saints with six on the year.

"I was excited to see our offense get going some today," said SF head coach Johnny Wiggs. "We had 15 hits in game one and quality at-bats all day."

The Saints pitching staff has now thrown seven shutouts in 13 games, three in a row, and own a team 1.47 earn run average. The Saints have not allowed an opponent to score a run over the last 27 innings.

SF (12-1) gets back to action when they host Polk State College today for a game scheduled to start at 3 pm.

Saints Softball – The Santa Fe Saints came up empty on their trip to Bradenton Saturday afternoon, losing both games of the doubleheader, 3-2 and 8-0.

Gabi Mathre (2-3) pitched well enough to win in the opener, but a last inning rally by the Manatees (6-1) pushed the winning run across with one out.

"Gabi did a great job of keeping us in the game," said SF head coach Lindsay Fico. "Her composure in the circle is getting better with every outing. I look forward to her continued growth throughout the season."

Game two was all State College of Florida, Manatee-Sarasota as the Manatees put up a single run in the first, three in the third and four more in the fourth in the game shortened to five innings due to the 8-run mercy rule.

"SCF pitched very well and we failed to make adjustments in the box," said Fico. "We have to learn to hit the ball down on a windy day like today. Everything we hit seemed to just hang up in the air today."

Adriana Garip was the Saints only repeat hitter on the day with a single in game one and the Saints only safety in game two, a double in the fourth.

SF (3-8) will host Tallahassee CC for a doubleheader on Tuesday with game one scheduled to start at 1 pm.
